I. PURPOSE

To authorize CCPs to monitor existing intravenous glycoprotein receptor inhibitor infusions during scheduled interfacility transport.

II. POLICY

- A. This procedure shall only be performed by paramedics with CCP (Critical Care Paramedic) training and designation.
- B. CCPs may not initiate glycoprotein receptor inhibitor infusions.

III. PROCEDURE

- A. Patients shall be placed and maintained on cardiac and pulse oximetry monitors during transport.
- B. Signed transfer orders from the transferring physician must be obtained prior to transport. Transfer orders must provide for maintaining the Glycoprotein Receptor Inhibitor infusion during transport.
- C. Infusion rates shall be consistent with Policy 540 Attachment A CCEMSA CCP Transfer Form
- D. The following parameters shall apply to all patients with pre-existing glycoprotein receptor inhibitor infusions:
 - 1. Medication concentration will not exceed the standard manufacturer concentration.
 - 2. The infusion concentration and regulation of the infusion rate will occur within the parameters as defined by the transferring physician The CCP, may discontinue the infusion (e.g., as in a case of bleeding).
 - 3. Documentation of calculation of the ordered infusion rate based on recent patient weight (in kilograms). Documentation of the following lab values should be included in transfer paperwork (if available):
 - a. Blood urea nitrogen
 - b. Creatinine
 - c. Hemoglobin
 - d. Hematocrit
 - e. Platelet count
 - f. Coagulation studies
- E. Incompatible with Diazepam (Valium) if given via same IV line
